## A Broken Man Cries Out to God...

### “Show Me the Way”

**W**hile his mother was working two jobs as the sole support of her family, John was running in the streets, drinking and doing drugs.

“I got mixed up with the wrong crowd,” he admits. “That (eventually) led me to prison and rehab, but when I came out, I did the same thing over and over and over again.”

By 2003, John was facing another 10 years in prison. But **his mother was very ill, and her last wish was to see her son again.** So the family bailed him out and John came home to “make amends.”

“I asked her to forgive me for all the problems I had caused,” he says shaking his head. “And she did.”

It was at that point that **John finally realized that his life was broken.** “I just sat down and prayed and asked God to please help me. I had never called out to Him before, and I said, ‘I need you.’”

God heard John’s pleas. Through his sister, John learned about the Life Change Program here at the Market Street Mission. Though he was a practicing Muslim at the time, John came to the Mission and “found a joy that I had never had before.”



John gave his life to Jesus and was baptized. He finished the program at the Mission, then began to rebuild his life. **Today, he runs a substance abuse ministry here at the Mission** and preaches on Sunday.

“God has been so good to me,” says John, his eyes shining. “When I preach a sermon, at the end, I always ask God to bless the Market Street Mission and the leadership and those who donate, because without their gifts, the Mission would not exist.”

That old song from *Porgy and Bess* may be a classic, but it certainly doesn't reflect what happens here at the Mission!


**If anything, summer is our most difficult time.**
